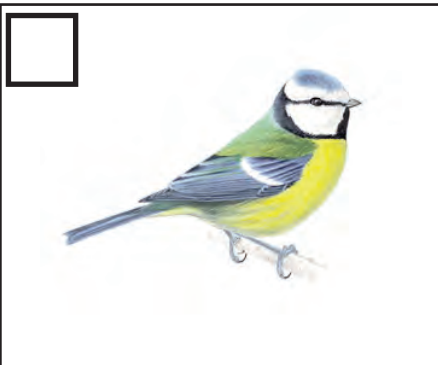


Bird Trail

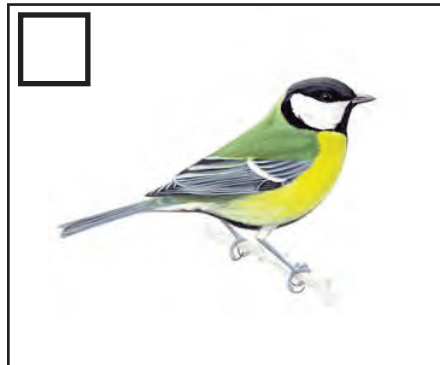
Many of the birds that you can see in the woods at Wildwood are also regular garden visitors - see how many you can spot today.

How many of these birds can you see at Wildwood?



Blue Tit

Listen for these singing in the trees near the entrance.



Great Tit

Larger than a blue tit with a black head. Also near the entrance.



Blackbird

Males are black with a yellow beak; females are brown.



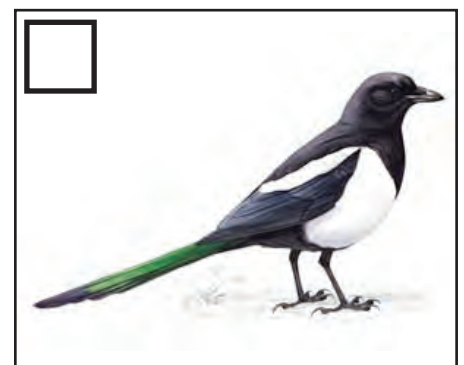
Greater Spotted Woodpecker

Listen for knocking sounds- see tree holes by pine martens.



Green Woodpecker

Often on the ground - flies away with a laughing yaffle sound.



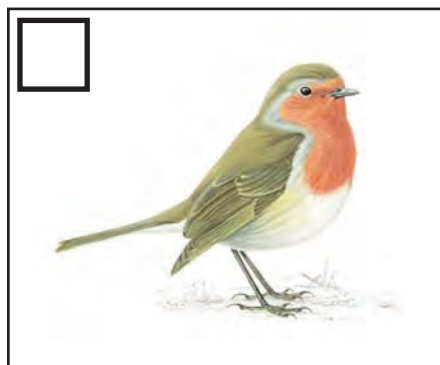
Magpie

Noisy black and white bird, often in family groups close to deer.



Jackdaw

Grey head, black body and nodding walk - close to restaurant and deer.



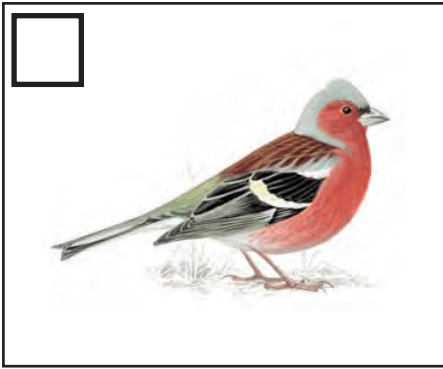
Robin

Often by restaurant, grateful for crumbs!



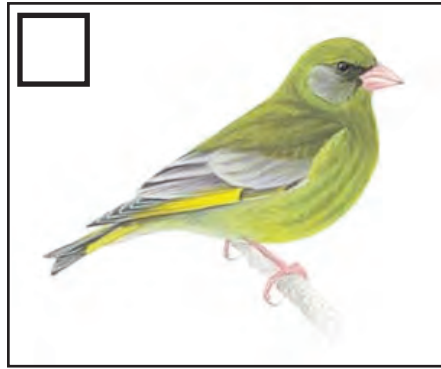
Pied Wagtail

Black and white small bird by deer and restaurant - tail flicks as walks



Chaffinch

Songbird, confident, pink chest, often near restaurant.



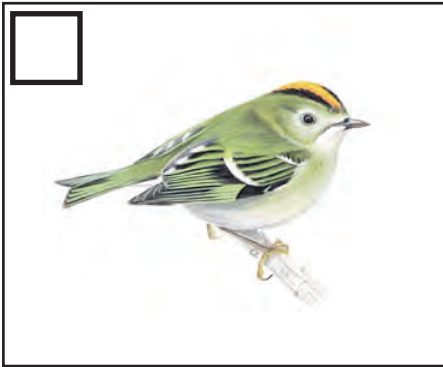
Greenfinch

Olive green and yellow songbird, often in small groups.



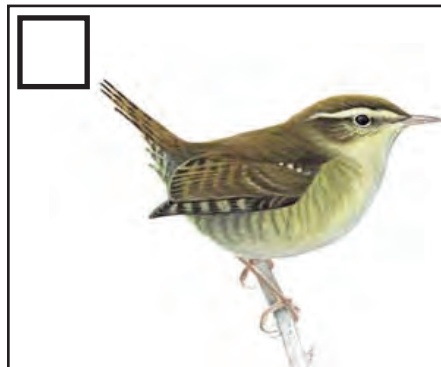
Jay

Large pink bird with shrill call - usually seen in badger enclosure.



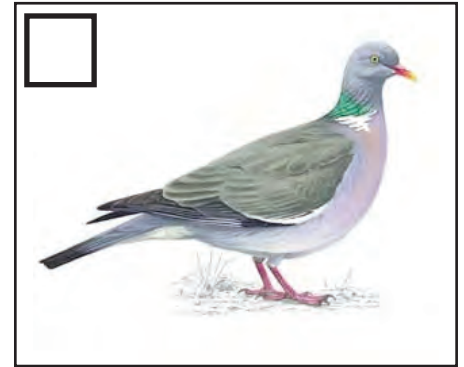
Goldcrest

Tiny green and yellow songbird in pine trees near wild boar.



Wren

Tiny, shy songbird - will be in low undergrowth looking for nesting sites.



Woodpigeon

Large bird flapping round in trees near wild boar.



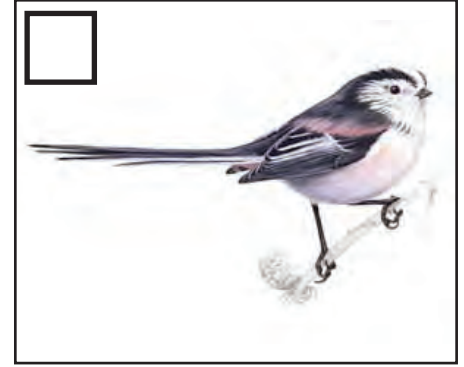
Kestrel

Hovering over open ground, searching for a mouse.



Lapwing

Seen occasionally in deer paddocks - look for crest on head.



Long-tailed Tit

Small flocks seen high in trees in winter, bubbling calls.



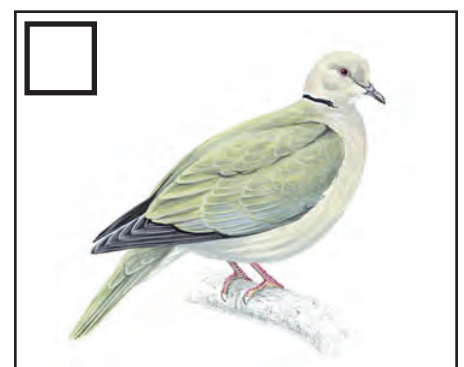
Song Thrush

Look for these hopping along in the undergrowth, looking for insects



Starling

Noisy and greedy, often seen circling in flocks at dusk



Collared Dove

Smaller than a woodpigeon with obvious dark collar
